I. How To Use This Workbook

1. The workbook can be used as a study guide for individuals or small groups who wish to work through this on their own.
2. It can be used with a group of Seniors on a Discipleship Team who desire to study and discuss these topics together with assistance.
3. Ideally, this information can supplement other training opportunities found in the local church and/or on the campus.

II. How To Teach The Material

1. The “Perspective” section at the beginning of each chapter can be used as an introduction to the topic.
2. The “Bible Study” introduces in a limited fashion some of what Scripture says about the particular issues and can be viewed as a stepping stone to deeper study. The study itself can be given as an assignment for the next group meeting along with any feedback from the “Discipleship Journal” articles.
3. The “Discussion Questions” section has been designed to facilitate group interaction and assist in developing personal convictions. It is important to understand that the goal of this workbook is not to answer all these questions for you, but rather for you to consider, study and pray over the issue you will be faced with as you graduate.
4. The “Recommended Reading” list has been compiled from Christian leaders in many areas of business, ministry, and family life. This is an excellent resource for developing individual or group projects for further study.
5. The "Personal Transition Plan" is the application step to determine additional information to gather, questions to ask, action steps to take and issues to trust God with.

The material is secondary. The Holy Spirit is primary to working through the Word of God and then your life as a leader to teach and model God's living message.

PERSPECTIVE ON FOUNDATIONS FOR LIFE

Within this decade, our generation has yet to see a military conflict like Operation Desert Storm. This operation was a massive challenge to mobilize thousands of people and equipment to the Middle East in order to free the people of Kuwait.

Today there is a great challenge to mobilize hundreds and thousands of Christians from the college campus into the battle zones of life in order to free men's souls for God's Kingdom.

The transition from the campus culture to the community culture is an unique challenge that students often face with much stress, limited preparation, and an incomplete perspective. The Foundations For Life workbook has been designed to be a helpful "mobilization" tool, providing you with perspective and resources and preparing you to make this crucial transition.

What is Mobilization?

The process of making a successful transition from the campus world to the graduate world.

How to be Mobilized:

- A. Develop a godly perspective on life and this world by understanding from God's word His purposes and plans for His children.**
- B. Discern God's unique plan for your life by understanding how He has gifted, prepared and equipped you to serve Him.**
- C. Locate role models, perspective, and information to help you successfully transition into these areas:**
 - a. Church**
 - b. Career**
 - c. Marriage and Family**
 - d. Community**
- D. Develop a personalized transition plan that will help you take specific steps upon graduating to land you firmly on your feet in the world.**

One of the challenges today for graduates is to understand a balanced Christian world view, which communicates that all aspects of our lives are of value to God. Therefore, we are an offering to God, “holy and pleasing to Him”. Ministry is not simply one aspect of our lives, but it is an outgrowth of Christ-likeness in all areas.

R.C. Sproul comments in *Battle for Our Minds: Worldviews in Collision*, . . . the Christian Gospel is not the narrow single-issue concern of "evangelism," as it is often misunderstood in our time. Paul in Athens (Acts 17) was challenging his audience at the very point of their underlying disobedience - their false and ungodly philosophy of life. As the base for spreading the good news of redemption, members of God's kingdom still can and must speak to the entire spectrum of our religious, social, professional, civic and cultural institutions. Unless our Gospel impacts all areas of the community - and not just our personal and private lives - the Christian message will increasingly become a paper tiger to be scorned and pitied, but not respected. We have taken upon ourselves the yoke of obedience to represent effectively our Lord in the world. Each of us must be about our Master's business in the particular sphere of our divine calling.

After Christ gave the "Great Commission" to His disciples in the gospels, the rest of the New Testament is given to show how to integrate that mission into all of life. The letter to the Ephesians can be viewed as a commentary on how the Great Commission is to be lived out. The various topics which are discussed in this workbook grow out of the major themes of Ephesians.

COLLEGIATE CULTURE SHOCK?

The actual transition from college to the marketplace is very similar to the transition a person makes when leaving one culture and going to a new culture. Some of the elements of this transition include: high levels of stress, inadequate preparation, and the need for perspective and encouragement in a new environment.

The diagram below, entitled "Culture Shock Cycle," illustrates what happens for a two-year, cross-cultural assignment. The principle of culture shock also applies after graduation, getting a new job, marriage, having children, or with any major life change. Understanding the normal occurrence of this cycle can lessen the shock involved in the transition.

(Notice there is an upward cycle at first when excitement and anticipation are high, then the first downward dip occurs and the "honeymoon" is over. It is important to use much discernment in decision-making during the first 6-8 months because your emotions and lifestyle are not yet stable.)

The next page, entitled "Student Stress Scale," can be a helpful tool in identifying what level of stress you have or will experience in your life. Complete this exercise to determine your stress level. For the Christian, the best way to handle stress is by walking in the power of the Holy Spirit and living a balanced lifestyle.

It has been said, "Don't resist change, it is God's agent of growth." As you are properly exposed to new and different experiences and people, perspective is developed. Perspective breeds maturity, and maturity breeds godliness.

IMPORTANT!

This material can be useful in preparing any college student for the transition from the campus to the world. However, the very best thing a college student can do to insure success in this world is to have a personal relationship with the living God who created the world.

This is possible by surrendering your life to Jesus Christ and trusting in His total and free payment for your sins through His death on the cross. His resurrection proved that not only is He alive but He is life and He is the giver of life.

Once you have a personal relationship with Jesus Christ and are growing daily, only then is a foundation for true success established. A life built on that foundation will stand the test of trails and time. This kind of person will also understand it is a lie that says real life is found in living for yourself. Instead he or she will be motivated by the love of Christ to serve Him and to build His kingdom.

It is our prayer that each of you will always find yourself in the safest and most satisfying place. A Christian can be right in the middle of God's plan for his or her life. Hopefully this material will assist you in discovering exactly what that place is!

PERSPECTIVE ON WHO YOU ARE IN CHRIST

As Christians, we are in a special relationship with God through Jesus Christ. Once we are convinced of God's love and wisdom, we are thankful for how He made us. This is the first step in accepting ourselves because we know that God created us and He can give us profound insight into ourselves.

God is very concerned with your development. He knows what you are meant to be. Any father is pleased when his children develop well, and God, our heavenly Father, is just as pleased when His children conform to the plans He has for us. He has created you as an unique individual for very specific reasons. In His love, He wants to assist you in developing and blooming. Discovering and appreciating "who you are" is just as important as knowing that you are "in Christ".

As you grow in understanding of your position in Christ, you can move further to know "who you are" and your unique role in His Kingdom work. This truth can be a strong motivation to investigate your spiritual gift, birth order, talents, temperament, and interests to function in areas of strength for your good and God's glory.

WHO YOU ARE IN CHRIST BIBLE STUDY

What is the overall purpose of understanding who you are in Christ? (1 Corinthians 10:31)

God is more concerned with who we are becoming than what we do. The whole chapter of Psalm 139 is a classic passage about who you are. What insights are especially meaningful to you?

- a. Read 2 Corinthians 12:7-10, in which Paul describes a limitation God placed on him. How did Paul react when God did not remove this limitation?

- b. Did Paul's handicap make him feel restricted in his service for God? How could you thank God for a limitation He has allowed in you life, whether it is physical, intellectual, an aspect of you back ground, or something else?

- c. What purpose for evaluating ourselves did Paul give in 2 Corinthians 13:5?

My Appearance

- a. What foundational truth about my body and my appearance is given in 1 Corinthians 6:19-20?

- b. How should this truth affect how I think about my appearance?

Personalizing your Mission in Life

It is good to know that we all can play a significant part in God's plan for the world. How does Mark 13:34 (in context with Jesus' parable) illustrate this principle that each of us has an individually assigned task from God?

Process of Finding your Mission in Life

1. Look Up!

Discovering God's mission for your life (beyond salvation) means becoming acquainted with God and His word. Reading God's Word prayerfully will help you discover your mission in life in a personal way. What are some meaningful benefits of God's word in relation to who you are? (Psalm 119)

2. Look Around!

What are the needs in your world that continue to get your attention? What do you see in your world that needs doing? What passages come to mind when thinking about recognizing the needs of others?

3. Look In!

After looking to the Lord and looking at the world around you, look within yourself. Look at your heart. Your unique experiences in life have sensitized you to particular needs in the world. Look over Psalm 139 again and write down some possible reasons God has allowed you to have the background, parents, and experiences that you do.

4. Look at your Talents!

After identifying a mission you could get excited about, you need to determine specifically what you can do to advance that mission. Find ways to be involved that will capitalize on the talents you possess. The next logical step is that you would make the connection between your mission in life and your actual career. Using your talents in your mission will enhance your ability to work joyfully and generously.

WHO YOU ARE IN CHRIST DISCUSSION QUESTIONS

1. What is your basic understanding of your position in Christ?
2. If you had the power to change anything about yourself, would you use that power and what would you change? How could you turn a "flaw" into an unique expression of God's love for you and a reminder to be humble? (Psalm 139)

3. What talents\interests do you have, and how can they be used to glorify God? Look at your heart and the unique experiences of your life to discern what needs you could meet in your world.
4. Knowing yourself is critical to discovering God's plans for you. List 50 observations about yourself that would describe who you are to a total stranger.
5. Your parents probably know you better than anyone else. Set up a time with them to get their input on your strengths, weaknesses, talents, and temperament.
6. Many colleges and universities have career development centers which have tools, tests, and resources that can be helpful in discovering more of who you are.

PERSPECTIVE ON CHARACTER

Character is the unique quality of life that sets a follower of Christ apart from those in the world. The strongest influence in our society is spirit-filled people who have Christ-like character expressed through various relationships. Developing character is a lifelong process, one that God is committed to carry out in you. Discernment is needed in this process so that you can perceive what God is doing in your life and learn significant “life” lessons.

As character is being developed, you must learn how to recognize the difference between character weaknesses and sin. Many times what is thought of as a character weakness can actually be sin. A positive way to view weaknesses is to discern what character strengths are taken to the extreme. An example of this could be a person who seems to be impatient, but actually may be taking the strength of efficiency to the extreme. However, it is important to remember that impatience can also be sin. Discernment is greatly needed in this area.

Again you can see that there is an interesting principle about praise as it relates to Character. When we praise God for His specific character qualities, He manifests Himself to us through these qualities, allowing us to experience that aspect in our own lives. For example, when we praise God for His faithfulness, He manifests Himself to us in faithfulness and we become more faithful.

The Church or Body of Jesus Christ is not just another option but a living organism ordained by God. Our relationship with God as His Church is compared to the most intimate of human relationships, that of husband and wife. Much like being married, complete commitment to the local church is foundational to relating properly.

Every Christian should have a proper relationship with the local church. Relating properly to the local church will not automatically happen but will be the result of obedience in the Christian's life. This is one of the main ways God ensures healthy growth for every Christian and ensures healthy ministry in the world. PERSPECTIVE ON CAREER

God is a worker and work got its start with God. Work is an expression of the Creator who designed His Creation with purpose and meaning in mind. He wove into the very fabric of your human nature a capacity for work.

Mankind's fall into sin introduced pain and toil to the work place. This leads some people to conclude that work in and of itself is bad. God placed a curse on the earth, not on work itself. You find the effects of sin in work as you do in every aspect of creation but work is not necessarily bad. Work is good and has value when it is done with the right motives and for Godly purposes.

Unfortunately, not enough Christians understand work in light of God's purposes for work and therefore find themselves unfulfilled and unhappy in their jobs. God does not have a hierarchy of important work which starts with pastors and missionaries. There are no extra "external benefits" for working in a "Christian Ministry." God's character can be expressed in many vocations.

The topic of career has some special considerations for women magnified by the fact that there is great confusion in today's culture on the roles God intended for women. God will call the majority of women to the noble task of being wives and mothers. This is one of the most effective means of how God uses women to fulfill the Great Commission. The Bible and history are full of examples of this fact.

Three Biblical Models for Putting God's Kingdom at the Center of your Work Life

You are not limited to just one of these models your whole life, God may use you in all three models by the time your career is over.

1. Mission in your Occupation

You may work in an organization that is not dedicated to accomplish God's agenda on earth, but you may be strategically positioned to accomplish your mission on the job. God enabled men like Joseph, David, Daniel and many others to rise in business and government service positions which allowed them to influence and advance His Kingdom through their occupations. This method could well be the most needed and perhaps most strategic model in today's world. God may be calling you to be used in a similar way. The Marketplace may be the most un-reached people group in our country!

2. Occupation support your Mission

Many people cannot or do not desire to raise support in order to have a ministry. Many countries around the world are closing the door to traditional missionaries. Because of these two realities, many laborers are seeing success by using their occupation to support their mission. In the New Testament, Paul was called to be an Apostle, but he didn't want to be a financial burden on the early church. So Paul learned a trade-tentmaking. Paul was able to provide for his needs by making tents and still fulfill his mission of teaching and preaching. This concept is usually thought of as "Tentmaking" for overseas but it works in North America also.

3. Mission as Occupation

God has chosen some to make their living exclusively from preaching the gospel. God has set aside men to be the leaders of the church and equipped them with the necessary gifts and training to do so. There is such potential for older and mature believers to influence younger Christians with their exemplary life in Christ. The Pastoral Epistles (I-II Timothy, Titus) outline the qualifications and duties of these leaders.

Regardless of which model you may be involved with now, a connection must be made between your work and God's work or there will be frustration and limited to no impact for Christ.

Just as God is in complete control over the whole universe, He is intimately associated with all your concerns and opportunities. It must be said that it involves a very poor, superficial, and un-Biblical view of God to say that He does not and cannot concern Himself with the details of life, cannot answer prayer, give relief in emergencies, or intervene miraculously in behalf of man.

Decision-making can either be one of the most dreaded experiences we must go through or an exciting process of growth and personal development, all depending on our knowledge of God's promises about guidance and our view of God's character.
